





We talk a lot at ThornCreek about how none of us have it all together and that God's grace to us in Christ can transform our lives. This Generosity Journal is an effort to allow the Holy Spirit to transform each of us. It's a tool we've developed to help you process through and "unpack" what it means to live a generous life. We won't ask you to give this journal back to us because we want you to keep it, to refer back to it, and ultimately, to reflect on the thoughts you've had and the notes you've made.

Some of the questions asked in this journal may be easy for you to answer. Others may take some time to really think through, or may not apply to you at this stage of your life. Our hope is that, as you spend time thinking about the impact that you can make in and through a prevailing church, this simple notebook will become a catalyst for meditation:

- On what God has provided for us in Christ
- On how the world in which we live tries to crowd that out of our lives
- On how God wants to work through you and your resources to replicate in others what you've experienced with Christ
- On next steps to take as your faith in Him expresses itself through love and generous living

Thanks for making time to read through this journal. We are praying that God will use this journal to encourage you and to equip you to lead our church as we prevail into this next phase of our time together at ThornCreek. It is a privilege to be on this journey together with you.

¹⁴ The farmer plants seed by taking God's word to others. ¹⁵ The seed that fell on the footpath represents those who hear the message, only to have Satan come at once and take it away. ¹⁶ The seed on the rocky soil represents those who hear the message and immediately receive it with joy. ¹⁷ But since they don't have deep roots, they don't last long. They fall away as soon as they have problems or are persecuted for believing God's word.¹⁸ The seed that fell among the thorns represents others who hear God's word, ¹⁹ but all too quickly the message is crowded out by the worries of this life, the lure of wealth, and the desire for other things, so no fruit is produced. ²⁰ And the seed that fell on good soil represents those who hear and accept God's word and produce a harvest of thirty, sixty, or even a hundred times as much as had been planted!" – Mark 4:14-20

Have I asked God why He has provided me what He has materially—and how He wants me to use it? Do I do this consistently?

What giving experiences – time, talent, treasure – have brought me the most joy? Has one of these brought me more joy than the others? Why is that? What if anything does this suggest about God's purposes for me?

Are there things in my life I need to let go of in order to prevail for others? For God?

¹⁹ After all, what gives us hope and joy, and what will be our proud reward and crown as we stand before our Lord Jesus when he returns? It is you! ²⁰ Yes, you are our pride and joy. – 1 Thessalonians 2:19-20

Do I see my assets as a sacred trust from God?

How intentional have I been developing strategies to leave behind not only a financial legacy to my loved ones but also a spiritual one? Is there a verbal expression of my spiritual testimony in my will?

What am I modeling—and to whom—on handling material resources well and living simply?

Have I thought about His will for me when it comes to giving both spiritually and financially to others?

Do I feel that I have made or am making the spiritual impact on others that I really desire to?

³ Every time I think of you, I give thanks to my God. ⁴ Whenever I pray, I make my requests for all of you with joy, ⁵ for you have been my partners in spreading the Good News about Christ from the time you first heard it until now. ⁶ And I am certain that God, who began the good work within you, will continue his work until it is finally finished on the day when Christ Jesus returns.
